God's Work, Our Backyard – Two Community Panels at Ascension

When I was about twelve years old, my great uncle and his family came to visit. We went to the zoo, drove through Garden of the Gods, and went to Seven Falls. I think it's one of only a handful of times I remember going to Garden of the Gods as a kid. It's the only time I've been to Seven Falls.

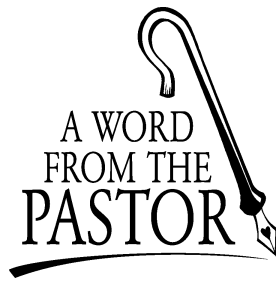
I bet you can share a similar story. I bet some of you have been to the top of the Empire State Building, but not Pike's Peak. Maybe you've seen Niagara Falls, but not the Pioneer's Museum. We miss the stuff in our own backyard, maybe precisely because that's where it is.

And it's not just fun stuff, either. Most American's know their elected Senator, but not their city council person. We know about the wars across the world, but are fuzzy on the fight over a neighborhood park. I remember reading all about a new Pope in 2013, and then being caught off guard when a high school just blocks away closed.

As we'll read later this month (Acts 17), when Paul was travelling and preaching, he recognized the needs and issues of the places he went to. In Athens, he discovered an altar "to an unknown god." (Probably the sort of place people only visited with their great uncles.) And he talked about how the message of the resurrection mattered *in this place*.

As Christians, we are entrusted with the gospel, the good news of God's undefeatable love. But the way that news is told and lived out changes in different places. It looks different in first century Athens than it does in sixteenth century Germany than it does in twentieth century Ethiopia than it does in Colorado Springs today. To know what God's doing *here* we need to know about *here*.

So, we're going to do that. On April 15 and 22 between services, Ascension will host two panel discussions with leaders from our city. We'll have folks really close to



home – like the director of KPC and the principal of Audubon Elementary. We'll have folks who can speak to specific populations in Colorado Springs – like the Homelessness Prevention and Response Coordinator for Colorado Springs and the director for a center on Aging. City Council, the Police Department, Ft. Carson, and UCCS will all be represented.

All we need now is you! These community panels are part of our Purpose Mapping Process, and the whole thing is pointless if we don't show up and listen. Your support for and engagement in the process so far has been great. Thank you! Let's keep it up in April and discover the treasures and challenges in our own backyard.

STEW CREW NEWS

John Donne, the 17th Century, and Stewardship

During a recent sermon, reference was made to *Meditation XVIII* by John Donne. This lamentation was written in 1624 and the pertinent quote follows:

No man is an island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main. If a clod be washed away by the sea, Europe is the less, as well as if a promontory were, as well as if a manor of thy friend's or of thine own were: any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind, and therefore never send to know for whom the bells tolls; it tolls for thee.

To lend some historical context: Donne is approaching death. Hearing a church bell signifying a funeral, he observes that every death diminishes the large fabric of humanity. We are all in this world together, and we ought to use the suffering of others to learn how to live better so that we are better prepared for our own death, which is merely a translation to another world.

In the full two-paragraph meditation, Donne meditates upon the sounding of a church bell signifying a funeral and connects it to his own present illness. He wonders if the person is aware that the bell has sounded for him. Donne then applies the idea to himself, using the bell to become aware of his own spiritual sickness, and to everyone else by noting that the church is a universal establishment. Every human action affects the rest of humanity in some way.

The church’s universality comes from God, who oversees all “translations” from earthly to spiritual existence which occur at death. Although God uses various means to achieve this changeover, God is nonetheless the author and cause of each death. Donne also compares this death-knell to the church bell calling the congregation to worship, as both bells apply to all and direct their attention to matters more spiritual than material.

Loving and caring for your neighbor is an important aspect of stewardship. Stewardship is part of everything we say and do, and every decision we make. God has entrusted much to us, and that includes one another. As we embrace the goal of “A Community Called to Serve,” we must remember that part of that service is to one another.

Notes from the Music Room

If you look carefully at your calendar this April, you may notice two different dates for Easter - Catholic/Protestant and Orthodox. There are complicated reasons for this difference, including the change from Julian to Gregorian calendars, but it is just one of many fascinating differences between how we and our Orthodox brethren worship.

In the Lutheran church, like most liturgical Protestants, we use an English adaptation of the Latin mass texts also used by the Roman Catholic Church for centuries. Martin Luther did not object to the Confession, the Word, and the Sacrament, but he wanted to clarify their context in the light of God's Grace given freely. In the Orthodox Church, the standard Sunday liturgy (script for worship) is the Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom, which was written in the 5th century AD under the leadership of John Chrysostom, Archbishop of Constantinople. This text is shared by Orthodox Patriarchates around the world, and though they sing it in different languages and styles, and each Patriarchate operates independently, they remain in communion. The musical traditions of the Greek Orthodox and Russian Orthodox Churches are the most well-known.

The service music in the Greek Orthodox Church may seem quite exotic to us. Firstly, Orthodox worship uses no instruments, so the only sounds is the human voice. Greek Orthodox musicians use different modes, like the unusual scales of medieval Europe, though theirs often sound like Greek folk music or even middle eastern music (remember, Constantinople is in modern-day Turkey). And like our chanted psalms, they often use repeated tones (repeated patterns of notes), though they may add a low drone note underneath.

Music in the Russian Orthodox Church is a lot more familiar to our ears, being more related to western classical music. Tchaikovsky and Rachmaninov both wrote beautiful settings of the Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom, much as Mozart and Schubert (and even Bach once) wrote settings of the Latin mass. As in the Greek Church, music is usually led by a choir and cantor, but the Russian Orthodox Church often favors lush choral songs over the chant-like call and response of the Greek Orthodox Church.

If you have time to listen, there are many recordings of the Greek and Russian liturgies online. They are mesmerizing and transporting examples of the many ways to praise and give thanks to God with the human voice alone. Consider adding them to your devotions.

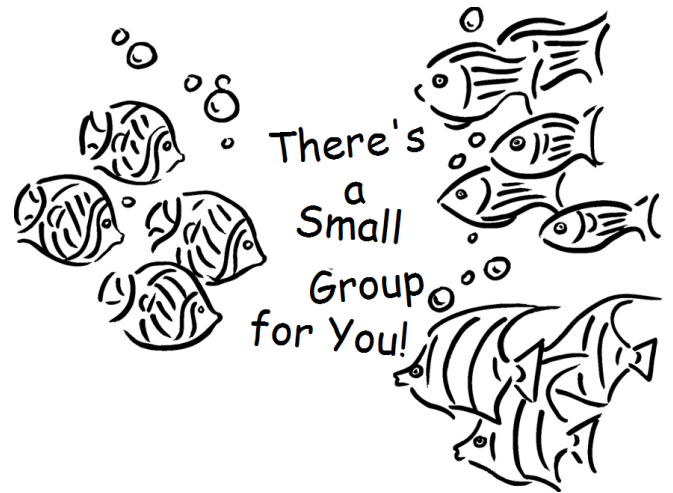
