

Who are you?

By water and your Word you claim us as daughters and sons, making us heirs of your promise and servants of all. (Thanksgiving for Baptism, ELW p. 97)



You meet someone new on the ski lift (winter's coming, we might as well look forward to it). After a minute of pleasantries about the sunshine ("But we sure need more moisture") and the lift ticket prices ("How's a family supposed to afford this anymore?"), the lift stops and you realize you're going to need to go a little deeper to keep this conversation going.

So, you introduce yourself. But, what do you say? If you have to give someone a sense of who you are, what do you tell them about? Your family? Your job? Your hobbies? What makes you *you*? Is it the car you drive or your ethnicity? What defines your identity?

It used to be in America that our racial and religious identities were central and formed our other identities, like our politics or the communities we join. But, a recent and respected study has shown that, more and more, that's changing. Respondents to the survey were changing their answers their answers on questions about religion and even race to conform to their answers about politics. In other words, for some, political identity is starting to take the more central place.

Now I believe that we all have many parts to our identity that are important, including our politics. But when it comes to what is central, we have a different claim as Christians. We are not first and foremost Republicans or Democrats or Independents. Nor are we first and foremost Norwegian, Hispanic, or even American. We aren't Toyota or Ford, football or synchronized swimming. We are God's beloved. The words spoken to Jesus at his baptism are our words. They were the words spoken at our baptism, and are the central truth around which the rest of our lives spin.

It's a blessing, and it's a challenge. It's a blessing to always have that identity. No matter what comes of the communities you're part of, the political parties you've associated with, or what strange roots pop up in your AncestryDNA profile. No matter how well you succeed or fail as a parent or child, in your job, or among friends. You are a beloved child of God.

And that's also a challenge. Because if that's our central identity, then it's up to us to see how the rest spins around that. It's up to us to see how we can engage in our families and communities as beloved children of God. It's up to us to see how we celebrate and repent of our heritage as beloved children of God. It's up to us to vote and spend our money as beloved children of God.

As a community of beloved children of God, may God grant us the faith to seize that blessing and the courage to seize that challenge.

If there is inclement weather, we will reschedule for the following Saturday, November 10.


Please bring canned goods for Care and Share. With canned goods, Rocky Top Resources, Inc. will accept our landscape debris for free.

The September 11th CPC meeting included the following actions and discussions:

- Pastor Daniel Smith led a devotion on baptism with a reading from Matthew. Reflecting on our baptism and how it marks us a child of God can be an effective tool in times of struggle.
- Pastor Dan announced his recent election as co-dean (with Pastor Carrie Baylis) of the Southeastern Colorado Conference of the Rocky Mountain Synod. Pastor Carrie will work the contact with the Synod and Pastor Dan will do more of the occasional meetings with local congregations.
- Jerry Dollar distributed the plan for his Board's God's Grace in Action Estimate of Giving program. The stewardship drive will conclude at the end of October. Check your mailbox for your letter and Estimate of Giving card. The ability to submit your estimate of giving via the church website is a new feature this year.
- Ann Marie reported on our financial activity. The congregation continues to give generously with monthly offerings coming in as budgeted. The CPC has set preferred guidelines and is monitoring amounts for Operating Cash, Operating Reserve and Capital Replacement funds. These guidelines will ensure financial stability for our church.
- The Capital Campaign renovations are complete. Continued giving toward the campaign is expected through December. At the end of the year, we will apply all excess funds toward the mortgage.
- The council was informed of a generous gift from Clara Remele's estate. Clara left Ascension \$100,000 with \$50,000 to be applied to our mortgage and \$50,000 to be added to our General Endowment Fund.
- Directors were asked to work with their respective Boards for next year's Budget. Priority was emphasized for funding of programs that support our ministry and could potentially help us grow.
- John Hayes expressed confidence in the Share Vision Way Point Team and their work to merge our passions, gifts/capabilities, and community needs into an overarching identity statement. Our consultant, Kristin Wiersma, will provide an update to the congregation on October 14th.
- First Lutheran is hosting a free Synod conference entitled "Money and the Church: for the Life of the

World." Ann Marie will attend the conference and encouraged others to attend on October 27th.

- The meeting was adjourned with prayers of concern followed by the Lord's Prayer.

Notes from the Music Room

Why is that one hymn so easy to sing and that other so hard? Hymns are in our blood as Lutherans; we all have our favorites and ones that we could do without. The Evangelical Lutheran Worship (ELW) hymnal that we've adopted in recent years has a very varied wealth of hymns. So, why do we struggle with some?

Well, our first challenge may be pitch. Most non-trained singers aren't comfortable going more than a note or two below the staff (those 5 horizontal lines we use) and start feeling tight or screamy as we approach the top of the staff. Techniques to help: As you go lower, relax and feel like you sing in a foggy, sighing voice. As you go high, don't push; feel light and floaty, almost using a girly voice. (Yes, even you, men; I have yet to hear any man sound like a girl when doing this.)

Many of our other challenges come from the style of the hymn. A lot of our contemporary hymns have unusual rhythms and differences from one verse to the next. Techniques to help: Familiarity helps make these easier, but also remember that these pieces are usually not meant to be too "square." So, don't worry or blame yourself if your rhythms feel a little wishy-washy. Focus on the words and enjoy the community; often it comes together when we just listen to each other and sing on instead of trying to get it right.

One of our last challenges is hymns from different traditions. If you didn't grow up singing Scandinavian hymns, the jumpy, folk-inspired melody of "Thy Holy Wings" can be surprising and challenging to understand, and the same is even more true for hymns from all over the world in our hymnal. They use different traditions of harmony and rhythm, almost like different languages. Tips: Embrace this new thing. Again, don't stress about perfection, but if you can, immerse yourself in these unfamiliar hymns. If you need to, just listen the first time through. Look them up on YouTube. You may be surprised at how they begin to grow on you and feel less foreign.

Remember, there was a time when Bach was too modern and challenging for many congregants!

Organ Committee Update

After listening to nearly a dozen organs from six different builders, the Organ Evaluation Committee is receiving proposals from three excellent organ companies. These builders have listened very carefully to our needs and have all proposed organs that are similar in size and have the type of sound that meets our needs. They have all proposed organs with about 15 ranks of pipes. Our current organ is smaller, but all of our builders and every musician that has played our organ agrees we need a larger instrument for our liturgy, congregational singing, to accompany the choir and for special church festival music. All of the builders have proposed designs putting the organ at the front of the church, in front of the sacristy. And all have incorporated our cross into their designs for the pipes. Our next step is to get final proposals from our three organ builders.

Celebrating Ascension's Generations

On 19 August Ascension celebrated the Greatest Generation, those born 1928 and before. We were blessed and honored to have many of them at the celebration. These individuals embody a generation that lived through The Depression and War with stoicism and valor, and helped America become the beacon of freedom it is today. When Democracy was in peril, they responded and they will never be forgotten. Ascension's Greatest Generation are Beverly Broin, Luella Gulbranson, Charles Hatcher, Joan Magee, Dorothea Mazigian, Norm Miller, Hazel Quintt, Marcile Riber, and Bill and Dee Yocum.

The celebration included a feature video, posters of events that occurred during that period, and reflections from our honorees about life and faith. It was a true highlight for all generations to share and reminisce with these incredible individuals. Here are some of their thoughts: Marcile Riber stated, "We never knew we were poor. It's just the way people lived." She collected foil wrappers from gum and cigarette packs and flatten them out for the metal drives during WWII. "I know that God was always there watching over me," Hazel Quintt remembers vividly living through the great depression. Dorothea Mazigian feels people of her generation were strong, healthy people who are self-reliant. She has no regrets and "would not trade her experiences." She used to listen to the radio in the evenings for entertainment. Chuck Hatcher worked the family farm and grew up in a family of seven children. They ate what they raised which included: wheat, corn, and sugar cane. Chuck remembers that it was a safer time when he was young and people didn't have to lock their doors. Beverly Broin remembers memorable inventions growing up such as The telephone and radio. There wasn't TV until the 1950's. For fun,

Beverly danced The Big Apple and Suzy Q during high school. "It wasn't a great time for women and the primary professions for women were teaching, nursing and being a secretary."

Luella Gulbranson grew up on a farm and so if she I wasn't listening to country music, it was church music. Her favorite hymns to sing were "The Old Rugged Cross." She stated she wants to "worship God and live in his ways." Joan Magee remembers getting to see several new inventions because her father was an electrician. He sold appliances as they were invented. She remembers getting the electric refrigeration, stove and irons. When she had cancer she would say the Lord's Prayer and annunciate to herself, "thy will be done," and trusted God to get her through it as he willed.

Dee Yocum remembers there was no electricity or running water in the house growing up and had to pump water every day. She took strength from singing her favorite hymn, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus. While laughing Dee shares, "that hymn got me through my teenage years!" In regards to her free time, Dee says, "there wasn't a lot of time to just have fun. You were busy doing the necessary things." Bill Yocum shared that before his family got electricity in 1939, kerosene lamps at night were their only source for light and a very dim light at that. "It has been a great time to have lived and to be alive and I take comfort in Psalm 21 and Psalm 121. I don't have to worry about the hereafter."

As part of the Generation Celebration's at Ascension, we will be honoring each successive generation in the coming months. Up next, those born between 1929 and 1945. Known as "the Silent Generation", however this is their time to shine and we certainly not silence them! This celebration will be between services on 4 November. We are beginning the planning for this now, and if you are in that generation and would like to share and participate, please contact Mary, Elisa or Jim. There are 100 of you at Ascension, so we look forward to a lively and informative and not silent celebration.
