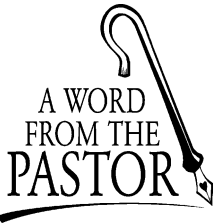
We Have Our Preferences

We have our preferences. To be human is to value things from the perspective of our family history, cultural influences and education. To be human is to have personality type that will influence how we see things. These influences are behind the variety of our preferences.

It is not surprising that we have a variety of preferences around our worship music. Currently, our worship music is drawn from traditional Lutheran sources with contemporary influences. This has led us to rely on an organ to lead our worship music. As our organ evaluation group discovered, our hybrid organ is failing and not worth continued repairs. After 32 years of use, the electronic circuits that control the bass speaker have gone out. And some of the pipes are not working.

Since that time, we have had members research organs for us to consider. Still others helped by creating a survey. Our thanks for all these and their hard work! From the 125 surveys returned, it is clear that most people prefer that we continue to use an organ. The survey had people largely divided between a 10 rank Keg pipe organ for around \$300,000 and an electronic Allen for around \$120,000. Because we lack clear congregational direction at this point, our leadership is planning further member interviews to find out preferences and giving support. The hope is these interviews will guide us on which of the two organs to recommend for a congregational vote.

This is one of those situations where we are not all going to get what we want. In the midst of our disagreements over our preferences for an organ (or anything else), it is all the more important to look to God. In God's Word, it is clear that what matters to God is how we treat each other. Further what matters is that we continue to come together to hear God's Word, share in his supper, sing our thanks for the many blessings we have and follow our calls to serve others.

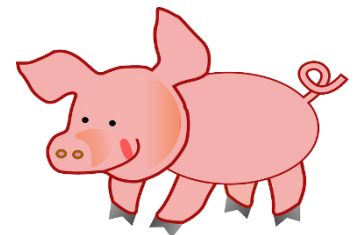
Summer Wednesday Services Begin June 26

Pastor Dan opened the meeting with a reading similar to those studied by the Contemplative Prayer Group

- Ann Marie Hindley reported healthy financial figures but noted that the CLC is continuing to lag behind expected revenues and is in the red by about \$4,000. Revenues are expected to pick up during the summer. The CLC will raise employee wages and their rates to counter employee retention challenges and improve their Profit/Loss line. She also noted that we sent an \$80,000 check from the Capital Campaign program to pay-down our mortgage. This was Ann Marie's last Council meeting as she and her family are relocating to northern Virginia. Ann Marie, thank you for your great service to Ascension. Russ Johnson was approved by the Council to be our new Treasurer. Russ, welcome aboard and thank you for graciously accepting this call.
- Pastor Dan attended a training session for the Stewardship for all Seasons program at the recent ELCA Rocky Mtn Synod Assembly meeting in Albuquerque. He explained that this program is expected to increase congregational giving by 10%. Board Directors were asked to develop spending ideas through their boards and present them at the July Council meeting for approval.
- John Hayes gave an update on our Strategic Visioning Process. Three of our first set of 90-day goals are completed. Andy Saunders agreed to lead our Belonging Pathway team to help improve the way Ascension welcomes newcomers and integrates new members into our community of faith. Andy is building his team and expects to have it in place in June. Pastor Dan and John drafted up the next set of 90-day goals and are coordinating them with Andy.
- John Hayes led a discussion on our Ascension Child and Youth Protection Policy letter. A few minor changes are being made to update this policy. Board Directors were reminded to give Arlayne the names of volunteers who need to have First and Second Level Background Checks completed on them as well as signed copies of the Ascension Child and Youth Protection Covenant.
- John Hayes led a discussion on the status of the Organ Replacement efforts. The Organ Committee is continuing to work with the congregation to advise everybody on the various options. A recommendation will be made to the Council on which option is most favored by the congregation. The Council will then make a recommendation to the congregation at an upcoming Congregational meeting.
- Pastor Dan concluded the meeting with a prayer.

A Large Gift to Support our Mission and Vision

During a visit one summer, my grandmother grabbed her pocketbook and with a smile on her face announced, “Come on girls, we are going to the toy store!” On the way, she told my sisters and me to think about what we’ve always wanted because she was going to buy it. There were no limitations. Our eyes grew wide with anticipation as we envisioned the possibilities.

I had a similar feeling when I learned that Ascension is blessed to receive a generous gift of \$225,000. This gift is intended to spur us on to greater generosity in support of our mission as a congregation. It also gives us the opportunity to make new impactful steps toward creating faithful community!

Beyond being used for our mission, the anonymous gift has come with a few other stipulations. The giver wants us to spend it and not leave it undesignated in a bank account. We’ve also been asked to refrain from using it to cover ongoing operating expenses like salaries (sorry Pastors), organ replacement, the Endowment, or mortgage reduction.

To honor those minimal stipulations, the council is looking to use the gift toward three areas of expanded mission: Internal Ministries (e.g. helping us in outreach and creating belonging pathways), External Ministries (e.g. support for top social outreach concerns) and Ministry Excellence (e.g. downstairs kitchen renovation). Over the next few months, our Boards will begin making recommendations that align with our mission and vision. The Council will then establish priorities to determine the way forward.

As a 7-year old girl, I grabbed the first exciting thing that caught my attention at the toy store. Years later, our council has a more purposeful and thought-out plan for this generous gift. My hope is that we don’t lose the excitement of a young girl shopping with her grandmother.

Notes from the Music Room



I was recently asked about the difference between two of our most frequent sacred musical words: Hallelujah and Alleluia. Is “Alleluia” the one we don’t say in Lent and “Hallelujah” the one best said with Handel’s Messiah?

Hallelujah is a Hebrew two-word command (Hallelu Jah) telling you to praise God with joy in song. The Jah is from the shortened form of the name of the creator, sometimes referred to as Jahweh. Hallelujah appears frequently in the Psalms, calling the congregation to join in with the praise and worship.

However, Greek was the language of the early Christian church, and the Greek dialects at the time were dropping the “h” letter. So in early church writings and Christian liturgies, the “h” was dropped to leave “alleluia,” and the “y” sound of the Hebrew “j” was replaced with an “i.” This a-word also came to refer specifically to the part of the liturgy where Alleluia is spoken or sung (like our gospel acclamation). In the modern Western Christian churches, this liturgical Alleluia is omitted throughout Lent, though it is still used by Orthodox Churches.

So, when you want to call upon people to praise the Lord, Hallelujah or Alleluia will both work. But if talking about the liturgical words we use throughout the church year, you’re talking about the Alleluia. Hallelujah!

As we have shared with you previously, the Board of Stewardship is pleased to be following the Midland Lutheran College “Spiritual Gifts Inventory” program this year. This exciting new approach to time and talent will form the foundation for our 2019 Spiritual Gifts in Motion program.

Over the course of the next three newsletters, we are pleased to introduce you to all 24 spiritual gifts. This month, we begin with the first 8 gifts:

The Gift of Administration

Characteristics

- Is good with details
- Likes to organize projects
- Keeps and analyzes data
- Coordinates people to accomplish a goal

Bible Example

- Joseph, during times of famine (Genesis 41-42) organized resources to help others during an

The Gift of Advocacy

Characteristics

- Speaks and acts on behalf of those whose power to change their living situations is limited by human systems
- Understands the dynamics of organizations and systems and works to orient them to meet human needs.

Bible Example

- Abraham advocated for any who might have been righteous when he bargained with God over the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah (Genesis 18: 17-33).

The Gift of Artistry

Characteristics

- Express themselves through visual images or through dance and movement

Bible Example

- Artisans were commissioned to build and decorate the Temple (Exodus 36-39).

The Gift of Discernment

Characteristics

- Has a natural ability to sort through available information and isolate ideas or situations to clarify one’s thinking and understanding
- Is often sought out for advice

Bible Example

- Peter and Phillip used discernment in dealing with the magician Simon in Samaria (Acts 8: 5-25).

The Gift of Encouragement

Characteristics

- Ability to reach out and help others through hard times
- Sees God’s presence in a situation and helps others become aware of it as well

Bible Example

- David’s actions in facing Goliath were an encouragement to the other soldiers (1 Samuel 17).

The Gift of Evangelism

Characteristics

- Has a natural ability to share their experience of God and Jesus Christ
- Inspires and challenges others to develop a relationship with Jesus Christ
- Points out God’s grace and hope for daily living

Bible Example

- Paul uses the gift of evangelism as he realize the needs of the jailer, and refuses to take advantage of the situation. In doing so, he earns the right to share his faith in Jesus Christ with the terrified man; and this leads to the jailer’s conversion to Christianity (Acts 16: 16-40).

The Gift of Faith

Characteristics

- Sees the Spirit at work in everyday life
- Believes the Spirit works through them
- Is ready and willing to trust and follow God even with little or no idea of what lies ahead

Bible Example

- As an honorable man, Joseph considered doing what his culture told him to do when he learned of Mary’s pregnancy. Yet his faith in God made him take a different course (Matthew 1: 18-25).

The Gift of Giving

Characteristics

- Recognizes God’s gifts and can turn them around and give to others
- Finds ways to give time, talent, and treasure that God has generously given to them
- Experiences great joy as they see God’s domain extended into the lives of others

Bible Example

- The believers willingness to share their material goods with one another is a picture of giving in the church. Many were willing to make great personal sacrifice as the demonstrated this gift
